EP are a completely voluntary group that aims to both to entertain the community and to provide a village focus for anyone interested in any aspect of live theatre. We might make both you and us laugh, cry, shout and even boo, but always strive to brighten up an evening and give you reason to go out and enjoy yourselves. We're firm believers in supporting the village community both indirectly, as one of the largest users of the village hall, and directly e.g. by our support of the Eydon Educational Fund via the recent Coronation Review – relationships we intend to continue.

You'll all know how the Eydon Players "theatre" starts and ends as an empty hall. A show doesn't really fully start to come to life until the stage is built. Erecting this is now much less hassle than it used to be since the new modular staging has been purchased by EVH, but it still needs considerable manpower and time to erect. This step is closely followed by the installation of the side leg curtains, and then by the building and placing of the backcloth and canvas drops. The set has to be designed and built, and many a chilly autumn and winter hour has been spent in

providing the wonderful, imaginative backdrops (each one takes 12 – 16 hours to paint) and properties for the various scenes.



That's not all... (and not to mention the on stage luvvies who also put in a great deal of rehearsal work in their own time)...there's a whole raft of people whose brief mention in the programme belies the colossal amount of time, effort and creative imagination they contribute; costumes and make-up are an integral part of the directors' vision of the finished article; the musicians are such an important aspect of a production in interpreting what complements the directors' work; and lighting and sound take hours of both design and delivery rehearsal. And how could any production run smoothly without a dedicated and effective front of house team who, along with bar staff will be attending to your inner needs? Last but not least let's hear it for the back-office ticketing team – no mean feat when it's all done remotely and electronically via social media. So, all of you please take a bow – you've earned it!

**The Freedom of Eydon** was approved with one amendment and would be publicised and open this year.

**The Village Litter Pick** was rearranged to the 30th March due to the weather which will hopefully have improved by then.

### **Tree Maintenance**

Bids had been received and a contractor appointed to undertake the remedial work required.

### **Grass Cutting**

A range of tenders had been received and a new contractor was appointed who had many positive references. The clerk would walk around the village with the contractor prior to the 1st cut.

### **Dog bins**

The Clerk had been reviewing the service provided by the existing contractor and on challenge the contractor ended the contract. The clerk was instructed to seek a new contractor provided the terms were reasonable as a matter of urgency. (Subsequent to the meeting this was achieved and a new contractor engaged at a lower rate).

### **Cooption of Councillor**

It was disappointing that still no volunteers had unfortunately come forward, Councillors were asked to

## **Anglian Water Donation**

A resident had written to the Clerk with suggestions with regard to dispersal on the donation from Anglian Water. Donations to the major groups or societies was suggested, and the Council discussed this, but noted that other than a dispersal of funds directly to Households (which still had significant issues), it was difficult to provide an “equitable and fair” dissolution of the funds. It was therefore agreed to ask for more views at the Parish Assembly on 16 April.

## **Portrait of the King**

The same resident and others had requested that the free portrait picture of the King provided free to Parish Councils be sourced and displayed in the Village Hall. The Clerk will arrange this.

## **Dog Waste**

A resident had requested the provision of another dog waste bin sited on Hollow Way. The clerk would monitor the current situation and report back appropriately.

## FIRST WEDNESDAY CLUB - Shipping Forecast

The night owls among us will be familiar with the soft Irish tones of Al Ryan as he reads the late night Shipping Forecast (12.48am BBC Radio 4).

On Wednesday March 4th Al came from his house in Doctors Lane to Eydon Village Hall to tell the First Wednesday Club about this cherished institution. Weather forecasting was pioneered by Admiral Robert Fitzroy, who as a young naval officer had captained the research ship Beagle on a three year expedition which a young naturalist, Charles Darwin, had been a member of the scientific team. Later Fitzroy who had been appalled by the loss of life at sea caused by unpredictable weather, started the first forecasts which, before radio, were telegraphed to all major ports, so mariners had at least an idea what to expect before they set sail. As many ships became equipped with radio, their skippers could be kept informed of changing weather patterns while at sea. Just over a hundred years ago, forecasts were broadcast on national radio four times a day, and many lives must have been saved by this knowledge. Al told us how now, with modern technology, these forecasts are no longer as relevant as they once were, but have become an institution, much beloved by night owls, and early risers alike.

Al described how the forecast is divided into three parts; the first covers the thirty plus sea areas, second, coastal stations and third inshore weather forecasts; each is read clockwise, starting in the northeast, and finishing in the north west. At the time of writing there are still four forecasts each day, but two of these, 12.01 and 5.54pm on long wave, will disappear on April 1st. This is not because of the whim of some faceless bureaucrat, but because transmissions will end on long wave as it is no longer possible to maintain the obsolete equipment. We will still have the early and late forecasts on VHF for the foreseeable future. Judging by the furore generated when the BBC tried to drop Ronald Binge's 'Sailing by' as a cost cutting exercise, quickly reinstated, no BBC mandarin would dare try to drop the 'Shipping'.

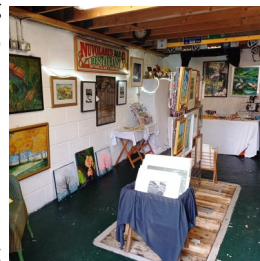
### Pop-Up Gallery-in-the-Garage event on March 9th & 10th.

The new contractor had started collection and this was also being monitored.

### Village Green

A resident had reported damage to the Village Green, this would be monitored and repair undertaken on the Village Tidy exercise.

### Grass Cutting.

The Clerk advised that the newly appointed contractor had visited the village and walked the area with the Clerk to confirm the necessary areas and any particular issues. The first cut would be in March followed by two cuts per month during the summer and one final cut in November each year.

### Kier Pocket Wood Proposal

The Clerk advised that he had received an offer from the Kier Group to supply up to 10 trees for local planting. The Council agreed to take up the offer and to plant them on the Culworth Road area which had been already identified as a site for wildflower planting.

### Re-starting Neighbourhood Watch.

The Clerk has received correspondence from the Regional Support team regarding restarting this service. It was agreed that the Clerk would put an article in EVN seeking a new local co-ordinator.

### Highways

The Highways Warden continued to pressurise Highways re pothole repair and The HS2 contractors and West Northants re coordination of road Closures

### Rights of Way Warden

A new Volunteer had been found to undertake this role.

The Clerk advised that he had been contacted by Paul Broadfield on behalf of the Ramblers Association and their "Don't Lose your Way Project". His Objectives are to identify any "lost footpaths" and have them restored to the Definitive Map (DM). As part of this process, he has identified a number of routes which do not appear on the DM, yet have substantive historical evidence to back up a claim that they should be on the DM. The Council believes that there may be recreational benefit to the relisting of these paths but recognise that there could be significant issues for local landowners. It was agreed that a meeting be called for interested parties so that a full and proper briefing could be arranged.

### Planning Matters: East Of Eydon

It had been noted that the current works were not following the submitted plans. The applicants were represented at the meeting and reported that they had been assured by their agents that they understood that the changes were within permitted development.

## *A Personal View... April 2024*

**Traditionally, the National Hunt Season commences in October and finishes in April.....**

These notes are being written after the Cheltenham Festival, and before the Grand National meeting, which this year is on April 13th. Eydon and the surrounding area enjoys an abundance of equestrian yards. It is rare to drive along our lanes this time of the year without coming across riders out exercising their charges. Almost without exception, courtesy rules with a thank you and a wave as most vehicles slow down and carefully pass by.

But get out onto the race track, and courtesy vanishes. The sport is mighty competitive with large sums at stake. Whilst there are no racing stables in Eydon, locally there are several yards in villages such as Edgecote, Culworth and Cropredy. There are National Hunt jump race meetings virtually every day somewhere in the country, during the season. Horses, jockeys, trainers and grooms travel often hundreds of miles to compete in a suitable race. Well over 50 years ago, soon after we were married, my wife and I were persuaded to have a couple of very ordinary horses in training with a part time trainer near Daventry. It was a rare event to see either of them run in a race. They seemed to always run at far away tracks such as Doncaster, Carlisle or Bogside. We saw more of them over a stable door at Clifton on Dunsmore! We were quite thankful when the trainer retired.

In more recent times, we found that becoming a member of a racing syndicate operated by a friendly Trainer, to be far more enjoyable and even productive. For a fixed annual subscription, one enjoys the benefits and fun of being a (part) owner and being able to watch the horses in training as well as attending all the race Meetings when the horse runs. A syndicate typically owns or rents several horses, so that the odds of having a runner fairly frequently during the Season, are good. At the end of the season, prize monies are divided amongst the syndicate members.

National Hunt Racing origins come from less formal cross-country racing and hunting, which led to point-to-point racing, across open countryside. Eydon had a master of cross country riding many years ago who told many tales of races, falls and achievements. Eddie Wilks lived in Manor Farm, on the Green. I recall him telling me about a race from Wormleighton to Priors Hardwick between half a dozen hunting farmers, which took place around Christmas in the early 1930's. The distance was about the same length as the Grand National course is now, some 4 miles. There were local names such as Maurice Passmore, Mark Darbshire and Tony Younghusband, competing. Apparently, all finished, eventually, despite a couple of them stopping off at Stoneton Manor on the way for liquid refreshments.

So, on April 13th, when watching this year's Grand National, just give a thought to the forefathers of Jump Racing and how they paved the way to make the sport nowadays so well supported and enjoyed.

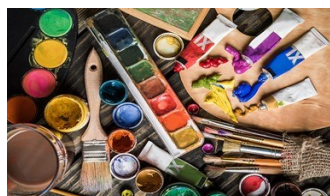

The Clerk was instructed to report the matter to building control as this was a breach of the written decision notice and the Council was required to report such breaches.
