Parish Council Matters

The June meeting was held on 10 June at 19:30 in the Village Hall

Attendance: Councillors Keith Simmons, Andy Reynolds, Kim Keeble, Lisa Genovese and Howard Carter were present, along with the Clerk, Steven Fox.

Previous Minutes: The minutes from 12 May were approved.

Council Governance: The Chairman advised that a resident has requested to be co-opted to the Council but the Council is awaiting Electoral Registration confirmation before actioning.

Public Comment: A member of EVHC100 sought clarity of various statements made regarding the Financial Probity of the Group and the Council agreed to publicise the following statements that had been previously made in emails between the Clerk and EVHC100.

"I would also like to make it **very clear** that myself, EPC and the Village Hall Committee have absolutely no doubt as to the financial probity of the EVHC100 Committee in undertaking these events."

and

"Management of Public Funds is always a challenging process due to the need for such high levels of Accountability and Transparency and I am very sorry if the EVHC100 feels that their financial probity with regard to the EPC Monies has ever been called into doubt. This would never have been the intention of me, EPC or EVH."

The Clerk, acting as the Responsible Financial Officer for EPC confirmed that £1000 had been received back from EVHC100 and that the Council had no further pecuniary interest in the management of EVHC100 and wished them success in their planned events.

Matters Arising

Maintenance of Steps into

VH. The Council continues to seek quotes from suitable contractors

Village Design Statement. An advert seeking resident engagement was placed in this month's EVN and the Chairman will now take this process forward.

Sports Field Footpath. WNC has advised that this would cost in excess of £100k, the Council agreed not to fully fund such work but agreed to continue to seek the work to be substantially paid by WNC.

No Parking and Pillory signage on Village Green. The Clerk reported that the Pillory sign is not back in place. AJR will fix the No Parking sign.

Planning Matters. The Council agreed to support the Applications for 31 High Street and to continue to Oppose the development of a double garage on the building development on 9 Moreton Road.

Highways. The Clerk advised that 11 Potholes had been reported in the Eydon Parish area during the month and 7 of these have been fixed.

Freedom of Eydon. In addition to the 4 new Freedoms announced last month the Council was delighted to bestow the award on the late Kevin Lodge who did so much for the Village in his engagement with Eydon Historical Society, the Mummers, Royal Oak Morris Team and throughout village life.

EYDON LADIES



The June meeting of Eydon Ladies was held on Wednesday 17th in the Village Hall where our speaker was Fay Tennet. Fay had stepped in at short notice as our original speaker became unavailable due to illness. We were certainly not disappointed as she gave us a most interesting, informative and insightful talk entitled 'When Terror came to Parliament'.

Fay had been an officer in the Northants police and at the time of the Westminster attack in March 2017 was Deputy Director of Security at Parliament. On that day there were approximately 5,000 on the parliamentary estate including cabinet ministers, the Prime Minister (Theresa May), security officers, police (armed and unarmed), media and members of the public. The devastating events that unfolded that afternoon were to have a profound effect on them all including Fay who gave us her personal perspective.

The perpetrator had hired a car, driven across Westminster Bridge ploughing into pedestrians, having got out of the car stabbed PC Keith Palmer multiple times and was finally shot and killed by armed police. From the time his car started crossing the bridge to the final shot was a mere 82 seconds! Shock, chaos and confusion ensued, but the security forces immediately put the whole estate into lockdown (as practiced) including both parliamentary chambers. This lockdown lasted approximately 5 hours, during which time there was a phased movement of all personnel to Westminster Abbey to take details from everyone.

Considerable trauma was felt by all those involved including Fay and her staff, particularly as PC Keith Palmer (who unfortunately died of his wounds) was well known to many of them. The Speaker of the House of Commons, however, announced that both Houses of Parliament would sit the following day. In the aftermath Fay and her colleagues had to deal with Books of Condolence, scores of flowers laid near the scene and, most challenging of all, the funeral of PC Palmer. The death toll that day was 5, but in Fay's opinion, without some of the measures in place, this could well have been higher. A security review was launched and additional safeguards have been put into place in the years since the incident.

Our meetings so far this year have been on a wide variety of subjects. The next time we gather will be our annual Garden Party on Wednesday 15th July 2026. This will be open to members only who will be contacted shortly with details of the evening which will start at the earlier time of 7pm.

FIRST WEDNESDAY CLUB June Meeting

Andy Chapman came to the First Wednesday Club this month to tell us about Northamptonshire in prehistory covering the time between the earliest known settlements from 4000bc to about 800 bc.

For a long time, it was thought that there was little or no archaeology in this county. It had been assumed that because the land had been farmed for many years anything that might have once existed had long been lost but in the early 1960's archaeological finds began to be discovered around gravel pits in the Nene valley. Although the county is not rich in ancient sites, interesting artifacts have been dug up, for example pottery left by the Beaker people, so called because when excavating the sites where these people had settled distinctive pottery beakers are often found. Sometimes as just broken shards in rubbish dumps, or middens, but also in old burials as grave goods.

Recently many more sites have been discovered, because it is now mandatory that before any work such as new road, railway, housing estate, or quarry begins the land must first be surveyed for any archaeological evidence. This has sometimes led to a site being uncovered when there has been no evidence of its existence on the surface. This has led to important finds being made from neolithic to iron age times, such as barrows, forts, farm settlements, and burial pits that were totally unknown about before work began. Not only have discoveries associated with human activity come to light, but also wildlife, Beavers were once common along Northamptonshire's rivers and streams.

Andy assured us that there still is a great deal to be found and sometimes in the most unexpected places.

Such a moment occurred at the Midsummer Dance at Eydun Village Hall on Saturday 20 June, when some 70 revellers assembled to hear the mellifluous tones of the Al Ryan Big Band.

The village hall itself underwent a transformation. Fairy lights twinkled, the glitterball spun and an atmosphere of expectancy hung in the air like the opening bars of a Gershwin tune. Presiding over proceedings was Eydun resident and the BBC's own Al Ryan - all-round impresario of mirth, who managed the feat of being host, performer, and genial master of ceremonies simultaneously with aplomb.

As for the band, the brass section blazed with heroic confidence, the saxophones purred and the rhythm section swung like a well-oiled pendulum.



Before the evening was out respectable villagers, many of whom had arrived with the measured demeanour of people intending to merely "tap a foot once or twice", found themselves executing fox-trots, jives, and various other manoeuvres – transporting us back to the days when ration books were still a topic of conversation.

There was something delightfully democratic about the whole affair. Young and old alike abandoned dignity with admirable enthusiasm. One gentleman, who shall remain nameless to preserve domestic harmony, was observed attempting a spin of such ambition that nearby dancers instinctively cleared a radius of several feet around him!

Yet the true triumph of the evening lay not simply in the quality of the music or the exuberance of the dancing, but in the unmistakable sense of community and inclusion. In an age of screens and solitude, 70 people gathered together in a village hall to share laughter, conversation and the irresistible urge to dance when the band struck up another number.



As the final notes faded and folks drifted home beneath the midsummer moon, one felt that Eydun had achieved something rather splendid; proof if proof were needed that life, when accompanied by fine music and excellent company, is indeed a thoroughly capital business!

A Personal View... July 2026



It's Grand Prix at Silverstone time again....

Love it or hate it, the time of year has come round once again when we face the road closures, extra traffic, the noise and excitement of the British Motor racing event of the year. And we are guaranteed that this will be the case at least until 2034, which means Silverstone circuit will have hosted the event for well over 80 years.

I remember my Dad taking me to watch grand prix events at Silverstone in the very early 1950's (*see photo below*). It always seemed to rain, rubber boots were *de rigour*, car parking was a lottery and when it rained hard, we always seemed to get the car stuck in the muddy field. As for the toilets, they were primitive beyond belief. Just a length of guttering on some bricks, emptying one end into a hole dug in the ground, which always overflowed. A canvas sheet held up by a few pieces of scaffolding, protected the modicum of modesty.

We soon got to learn not to sit in the front two or three rows of the temporary grandstands. The canvas roof collected the rain, and every now and then a gust of wind would empty several hundred gallons of water over the unsuspecting occupants below.

But, we enjoyed the thrill of the racing, something new to most of us. Glamorous foreign drivers competed with our amateur British entrants. Chiron, Farina and Fangio against Parnell, Moss and Hamilton. I must have been starstruck, as only a few decades later opted not for big time Formula 1 racing, but more sedate vintage stuff.

I entered a vintage car I had restored, for some overseas races. The idea was to have a continental holiday in the 1928 Bentley, and enjoy some motor sport at the same time. It all got a bit serious, and I was persuaded to enter the 1979 Oldtimer Grand Prix (*photo right*) in Austria. My wife Patricia and I drove it out there, where the car remained for the summer season of racing.

We both came back to the UK between racing, as we both had commitments at home and work. I left the car with a racing icon; 'Lofty' England of Jaguar fame was living in

Austria by then, and he kindly looked after my Bentley. I was lucky enough to race against the likes of Fangio and Schellenberg, and won awards for the car travelling the

furthest to the races. Fangio drove a 1954 Mercedes, some 25 years newer than my Bentley, and despite my valiant attempts to keep up with him he lapped me after some 5 laps of the 2.7-mile Salzburg-Ring circuit.

Nevertheless, being the only UK entrant that year, some 47 years ago, was truly satisfying leaving memories to be cherished.
